- 1- What do we need to leave behind? What are the approaches that no longer fit with the world we are heading into? What are the structures and processes that have revealed to be inadequate, unsuited or inappropriate for the world emerging from this crisis? What did the crisis show was no longer appropriate and what has emerged from or been exacerbated by the crisis?
- 2- What do we want to keep? What are the values, approaches, structures, processes that reflect our values and needs? What should we keep as it is and what should we adopt/change?
- 3- What should we do differently? What could we do differently, given what has been revealed by the crisis? What should we change? What should we experiment with? What should we attempt now?
