


Statistical Tables – Full set of indicators, available data on racial disparities and gender gaps

Data for the index drawn from existing sources, including:

- US Census Bureau
- CDC
- Guttmacher Institute
- Center for American Women in Politics

Complemented by a new nationally representative survey of 2600 adults, conducted with YouGov and PerryUndem in August, covering gender, racial inequalities, and the effects of COVID-19.

Insights from our new survey

Overall, two-thirds of Americans think that more work has to be done to achieve full equality in the United States.

Democrats and Black Americans are much more likely to say that there is more to do.

Figure S2.1 In the United States, do you think there is full equality for women in work, life, and politics —or is there still work to be done?




FIGURE 3 What does gender equality look like to you?





FIGURE 2.5 Traffic lights highlight uneven performance across the index indicators, 2020

Women face serious security and justice constraints

Nearly 80 percent of men feel safe walking within a mile of their neighborhood at night, but only 56 percent of women

University of Chicago's General Social Survey.

"Just walking down the street because I'm a woman makes me feel unsafe. Men stare and whistle to get my attention, when clearly I'm just minding my own business and I want to be left alone."

—Hispanic woman from Texas, age 44, on a time she experienced discrimination or felt unsafe because she is a woman


FIGURE 3.9 Stories of discrimination and insecurity

FIGURE 3.6 Two-thirds of adults believe that access to abortion is important to women's rights

Responses to the question: "In your view, is access to abortion an important part of women's rights and equality, or not?"



Overall support for women's sexual and reproductive healthcare is strong, with 65 percent of adults believing that access to abortion is important to women's rights.


However, support is much lower among Republicans.

Key factors explaining performance

Multivariate analysis finds that states which do better tend to be :

- More urban
- Controlled by the Democratic party for more years
- Less racially diverse
- Richer


FIGURE 2.4 Some states fare much better and others much worse in their index rank compared with their rank on per capita income, 2020




Only one state currently has gender parity in political representation

FIGURE 3.3 The best and worst states for women's representation in the state legislature, 2020








FIGURE 3.4 Democratic women hold twice as many state legislature seats as Republican women, 2020

Figure S2.6 Views differ on whether the country would be better off with more women in political office




Support is strongest among Democrats and Black Americans.

Tackle overlapping disadvantage – and especially constraints facing women of color. More important than ever amidst COVID-19.


Close gaps in legal protection – from economic protections to ensuring abusers do not have access to firearms.

Ensure access to the full range of reproductive health services

Promote women's voices – boost political representation

Improve the data – including on intimate partner violence and financial inclusion and ensure that data are racially disaggregated.

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
